While much of Suffolk's idyllic landscape appears unchanged over the centuries, as many of the photographs show, its coastline is subject to dramatic and rapid transformation at the mercy of the sea. In some instances photographs taken just a few years apart reveal the extent and rapidity of change. The contrast between the county's seemingly abiding landmarks, its coastal towns and villages, timeless harbours, historic churches and stately houses, and the ravages of the everencroaching sea is what makes this book so engrossing.

Anyone with an interest in the effects of sea-level rises upon our small island will be gripped by these images, and for those living in Suffolk and its neighbouring counties, this book will hold a particular fascination.
