The main core of the book is a chronology of Derby County's 134-year history. The ebb and flow of each season is built up, step-by-step, via succinct, one-sentence facts along-side exact dates, thus allowing the reader to feel the ecstasy and the agony (mainly the agony) of their counterpart fans, back in the day. Within the chronology though, seasons and decades are punctuated with a host of quirky facts, strange events, bizarre coincidences and striking statistics, while "Perspective" snippets demonstrate that football is just a game, but life is a whole lot tougher.

However, if it's plain "barmy" that you want, then check out the Barmy Yarny, a short piece of fiction about Derby County that is sure to have you laughing out loud, while the story is accompanied by conventional and quirky facts relating to the 154 Rams players who appear in the yarn!

So if you're up for it, go ahead, prime the Ramometer and take your seat at Pride Park. Or given the offbeat nature of parts of this book, perhaps you'd prefer an away trip... perhaps to St Flanneldrews, The Guffawthorns or The Stadium of Tripe...

Derby-born Andrew Beardmore has been a lifelong supporter of his home-town club. In his first match as a young boy, he saw Derby County lift the Texaco Cup after beating Airdrieonians 2-1. 



When Derly won their fifth game on the bounce at Gillingham on 22 Oxtober 1985, the Rasus mound up to 2m 22 himst from 13 games. However, they were FOURTEEN POINTS labbard loaders Reading — as the Reyals had won all 13 of their first 13 langue games?

When Derby heat York City on 8 Feb 1986, they were 3rd in Div Three, but had only played 25 games, and had as many as SEVEN games in hand on some teams. They somehow had to fit 21 league games into 3 months, and eventually crawled over the finish line in mid-May.

RAMS CHRONOLOGY: ARTHUR AND ROY: THE 1980s

In the back-to-back Division Three seasons of 1984/85 and 1985/86, Derby actually played Hartlepool United FIVE times in the League Cup and FA Cup, winning three and losing one.

Derby County won the Central League again during season 1985/86, and became the first (an only) Third Division club to achieve this.
